We are hoping to have a good year and to be able to bless the lives of many children and their families, as well as help the churches and the local community.

Fundraising Activity

We were invited to be part of a car racing event where different people from outside our community come to race and LHBH was in charge of the ticket sales. We also sold T-shirts with the LH logo and the logo of the donors that we had for the activity, we sold food, and drinks.

We are happy that even though we had some setbacks, such as rain during the afternoon time we got to sell everything. The children and parents that were there had a good time, as well as the staff. We are also very thankful for the group of volunteers we had supporting the activity, such as Daryl and his family, they were of great support.



We had the mayor come over to help us with an advertisement video for the event and his administration donated the chicken meat and some beverages for the day, it was very nice to have his support.

After expenses, we brought in L. 46,961, about \$1870 US. We will meet with the parents to decide how these funds will be used as there are different needs around campus that can be covered with these funds.

As usual, we went to pick up our donations of the month. This time Maybelline and her husband went to get the donations. We had all the regular donations such as rice, dry beans, cans of black beans, sacks of wheat, hand sanitizer, face masks, boxes of Mannapack, and personal hygiene items, such as tooth paste, tooth brush, deodorant, etc. This month's donations also included cleaning supplies that are of great help for keeping our facilities clean.

We are very thankful for this ministry and how you have been supporting us all these years. The donation we have every two months helps us cover many needs at LH. We use the rice and beans for daily meal preparation for staff, children and visitors, we also donate it to our children and their families, as well as to our staff when they need it, some church members, Bible class students and other visitors.

We are looking forward to the coming months as it is always nice to see our friends and meet new people.
